Pack More Stuff In Less Space

(NAPSA)-There are two kinds of travelers in the world: those who pack light and those who wish they had. The key is to include everything you need in as little space as possible.

Some of the most travel-savvy people in the world-travel agents-offer some helpful tips and techniques for efficient packing for all types of travel:

- Make a plan and stick to it. As an architect plans a building, so must you plan the contents of your suitcase. A packing list eliminates the panic of last-second packing, serves as a handy guide for repacking at the end of the trip and can be beneficial in the unfortunate event of lost or stolen luggage.
- Check the weather forecast of the destination and plan accordingly. Also, be sure to know the local traditions. Although many places have relaxed their dress codes, a T-shirt for dinner could be a serious blunder, or bare shoulders may bar your entrance into such places as St. Peter's Basilica in Vatican City. Bare legs for men and women are strongly

discouraged if not prohibited at holy sites in many religions. For almost all outdoor activities, take pieces that can be layered.

- Lay out the items you intend to take and reexamine your list. If possible, weed out single-use items and extras.
- Travel kits are best for toiletries. Having a travel kit perpetually stocked in a waterproof case will save packing time before the trip

and aggravation after arrival. Most personal toiletry items come in inexpensive travel sizes, so purchase these whenever you see them, so as not to arrive with a half-empty bottle of your favorite hair gel.

- Iron everything before packing. If it goes in crisp and clean, odds are more in its favor of coming out the same. Button all buttons and zip all zippers.
- Know when to fold 'em. Practice folding like it's done in clothing stores-that method is used for a reason. The better the fold, the fewer the creases.
- Try to think chronologically, placing the items to be worn first on the top. This will prevent rooting around the suitcase for a specific item while disrupting the rest.
- Always carry travel documents, medication, jewelry, traveler's checks, keys and other valuables in your carry-on luggage. Items such as these should never be packed in checked luggage. For more packing tips, go to www. travelsense.org.

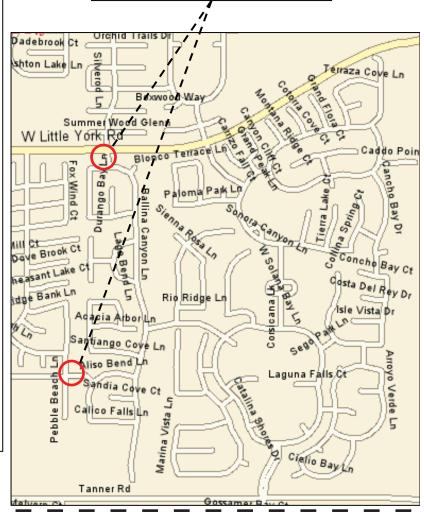

Tomatoes-No Refrigeration Required

(NAPSA)-Did you know that one of the most popular vegetables in the United States is actually a fruit? Categorized by botanists as a fruit but eaten by consumers as a vegetable, tomatoes are appreciated for their combination of sweetness and acidity.

Any way you slice it, tomatoes are a delicious way to add nutrients to the diet. They are rich in vitamins A and C and are a good source of potassium. Tomatoes are also naturally low in sodium and contain no cholesterol.

Many people store tomatoes alongside other vegetables in their refrigerator's crisper drawer, but that's not the best place for them. Tomatoes should be stored at room temperature to maintain maximum flavor. Cool temperatures inside your refrigerator will stop the ripening process and begin to decrease the flavor and change the texture. Try storing your tomatoes in a decorative bowl on the counter.

Tomatoes and bananas help each other ripen quicker. Tomatoes and bananas emit a naturally occurring ripening gas called ethylene and when you store the two together they both ripen rapidly. If you need to ripen a tomato quickly, store it in a



closed paper bag on the counter. The ethylene gas speeds up the ripening process when confined around the fruit in a closed bag.

Although tomatoes are native to Central and South America, they are now eaten throughout the world and are an ingredient in countless recipes. Many people consider tomatoes an essential part of their vegetable gardens each summer and they are available at your local market year-round.

Pico de Gallo

Pico de Gallo is a fresh tomato salsa often served as a dip for tortilla chips but it's also terrific spooned onto grilled fish, chicken or pork.

Ingredients:

- 8 SUNRIPE Bella Roma (plum) tomatoes, chopped
- 1/4 cup red onion, finely chopped
- 2 jalapenos, minced
- 1/2 cup cilantro, chopped

Juice of 1/2 a lime

- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper

Instructions

Mix all ingredients together and enjoy. Serves: 8 - 1Ú2 cup of vegetables per serving

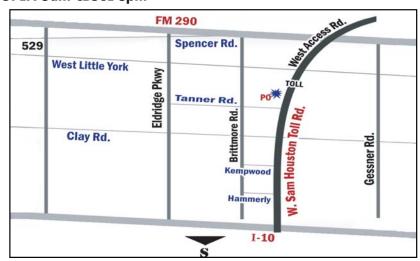

Keeping cool when the weather is hot

It's summertime and you head out for a run. Before you even finish the first mile, your body feels as though it might ignite from the heat. It's not your imagination. Fifteen minutes into your run and your body temperature could be as high as 5° F above normal. If you were to continue at this pace, fatigue and heat illness would no doubt take over.

Strategies to protect yourself from heat illness

The above scenario doesn't have to happen. Drinking enough fluid, whether it be water or a sports drink, is imperative for exercising in hot or humid weather.

Maintenance of body fluids is essential to maintaining proper body temperature. Sweat dispels heat through your skin. If you let your body become dehydrated, you'll find it much more difficult to perform even the lightest of workouts.

But don't wait until you're thirsty to start replenishing those fluids. Chances are, by the time you actually feel thirsty, your body is well on its way to becoming severely dehydrated.

The following strategies will help you protect yourself from the onset of heat illness:

1. Hydration

Fluid replenishment before, during and after exercise is essential to avoid progressive dehydration. Always consume more fluids than you think you need before and after exercise, and strive to drink six to eight ounces of fluid every 15 to 20 minutes during exercise.

2. Exercise Intensity

You should probably reduce the intensity of your workout, particularly the first few times you are exposed to higher temperatures.

3. Temperature

Use the heat stress index table to determine the risk of exercising at various combinations of temperature and humidity. While a 90° F outdoor temp is relatively safe at 10 percent humidity, the heat stress of 90° F at 50 percent humidity is the equivalent of 96° F. When the heat stress index rises above 90° F, you may want to consider postponing your exercise session until later in the day. Or, plan ahead, and beat the day's heat by working out early in the morning.

4. Fitness

Physical training and heat acclimation can increase your blood volume, helping to regulate body temperature more effectively. Interestingly, the acclimatization process can be completed in 7 to 14 days of repeated heat exposure. However, you must always continue to drink fluids before, during and after exercise.

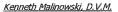

5. Clothing

Wear minimal clothing to provide greater skin surface area for heat dissipation. Your clothing should be lightweight, loose fitting, light colored to reflect the sun's rays, and of a material that absorbs water, such as cotton.

6. Rest

Know when to say 'no' to exercise. Using common sense is your best bet for preventing heat stress when Mother Nature turns up the heat.

Heat sensation risk of heat injury

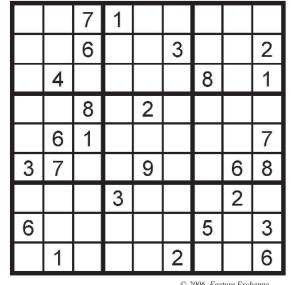
- 90° 105° Possibility of heat cramps

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Van Arsdale Presents Overview Of Special Session, School Finance Reform

HOUSTON (June 23, 2006) - Texas House District 130 Representative Corbin Van Arsdale can finally get back to his routine at home – at least until early next year when the 80th Legislature convenes.

Van Arsdale, who spoke at the June 20 general membership luncheon of the Cy-Fair Houston Chamber of Commerce at Raveneaux Country Club, joked that when people ask the two-term legislator how long he has served in the House, he tells them nine sessions – two regular sessions and seven called sessions.

At the Chamber luncheon, he presented an overview on the recently concluded special session at which legislators finally hammered out school funding laws to replace the so-called "Robin Hood" plan.

"The problem with Robin Hood is that over the years more and more of the burden of financing schools has fallen to the local level," Van Arsdale said. "As long as the local portion is going up and up, you're going to have more redistribution. The only way to fix this is to push more from the local level to the state level. When you start pushing things to the state level, the state can't tax property or income."

Van Arsdale noted that the governor's school finance panel, headed by former state comptroller John Sharp, did in-depth studies and hired economists to examine the issue. The final result, adopted by the House and Senate and signed into law by Gov. Rick Perry on May 31, was a mixture of consumption taxes, revamping of the franchise tax and use of budget surplus to reduce school property taxes for

property owners.

The consumption tax increases affect cigarettes and smokeless tobacco but not cigars, Van Arsdale said. Because private-party automobile transaction prices are virtually impossible to document, all used car sales taxes will now be based on a vehicle's so-called "blue book" value.

The franchise tax, which only about 6 percent of Texas businesses paid because they found loopholes, was scrapped in favor of a "margin" tax. However, the margin tax will not apply to sole proprietorships, charities, general partnerships or companies that earn less than \$300,000 in gross revenue, Van Arsdale said. The tax will not be payable until 2008.

According to Van Arsdale, all the new revenue will be channeled into a special fund that is separate from the regular budget. The school finance fund will reduce property taxes 11 percent this year and another 22 percent by 2007. The bill signed by Perry also included a \$2,000 raise for teachers.

The legislation also included incentive pay for teachers, a mandatory four years of math and science courses for high school students, a mandatory late-August start date for schools, sanctions for low-performing charter schools, a provision that school elections must be held on the same day as city or county elections, and a requirement that districts post their financial information on their Web sites.

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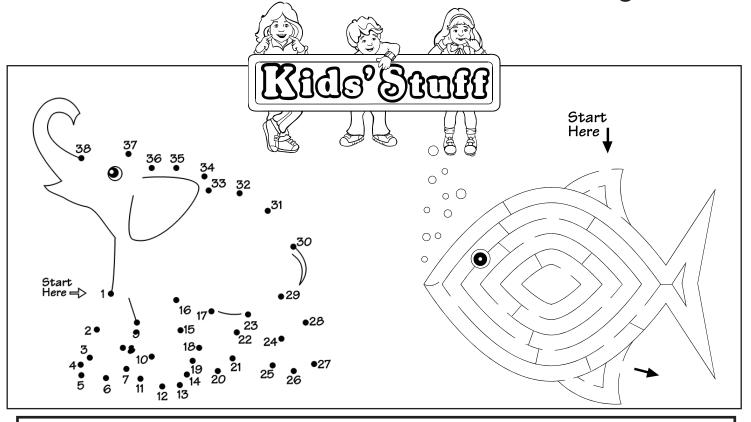
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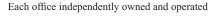
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
