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Fertility Rises as Weight Drops

Baylor College of Medicine

HOUSTON – (Jan. 25, 2007) – Weight loss surgery could have surprising results for some women - as the pounds melt off, the chance of becoming pregnant increases.

Dr. Vadim Sherman, assistant professor of surgery at Baylor College of Medicine (BCM), said obese women who thought they could not have children regain their fertility during the months following gastric bypass or lap-band procedures.

“Weight effects how hormones act in the body,” Sherman said. “Body fat helps to convert certain hormones such as estrogen into other hormones. If there is extra body fat, healthy hormonal changes are thrown off.”

Hormonal imbalances can lead to irregular menstrual cycles and other reproductive problems. As women begin to lose weight, their fertility returns back to normal. For bariatric patients, the weight comes off rapidly, and some are surprised by how quickly pregnancy can occur. In some cases women become pregnant within six months of surgery.

“We recommend waiting a year, when weight stabilizes, before having a child,” Sherman said. “But women who become pregnant sooner can still have healthy children.”

On average more than half of excess body weight is lost during the year following surgery. One fear is that the dramatic change in weight will affect the fetus’ health.

“Some worry the weight will continue to come off and be harmful to the pregnancy,” Sherman said. “Weight loss usually stops and some women even gain up to 20 pounds.”

Sherman said if nutritional needs are met, including all the usual vitamin guidelines for bariatric surgeries, a woman can expect a healthy pregnancy.

Follow the 60/60 Rule for Years of Good Ears

Safe use of music devices like iPods and digital MP3 players will help listeners – especially young ones – avoid permanent hearing loss. When using earbud-type headsets, audiologists recommend plugging into music for no more than 60 minutes at 60 percent volume to keep from damaging the delicate hair cells and mechanisms of the inner ear.

The statistics for hearing loss have been escalating since the 1980s when personal listening devices, like the Walkman and portable CD players, entered the market. Hearing loss in younger people continues to increase rapidly, and audiologists report that this high level of loss is more typically seen in aging adults.

Professionals say that earbud use is the primary cause. Earbuds are lodged very close to the eardrum, deliver a very crisp sound, and make it easy to listen to music for longer periods of time at an excessive volume. Some manufacturers even print warnings on their packaging. You can prevent hearing loss by following these three suggestions:

- Listen to music with earbuds for no more than one hour per day.
- Do not turn the volume louder than 60 percent of the maximum.
- Use muff-type headphones instead of earbuds.


Income Tax Submission Tips

To ensure that your IRS tax return is processed quickly, review it thoroughly for accuracy and completion. See Tax Topic 303, for a complete "Checklist of Common Errors When Preparing Your Tax Return," available at www.IRS.gov, or by calling the TeleTax number, 1-800-829-4477. Here are a few suggestions for preventing the most common errors:

- Use the peel-off label provided with your tax forms. Make corrections directly on the label.
- Select only one filing status, plus the appropriate exemption.
- Use the correct Tax Table column for your tax amount.
- Double-check all figures.
- All parties must sign and date the return.
- Attach all Forms W-2, Wage and Tax Statements, and other forms that indicate tax withheld.
- If you owe tax, be sure to enclose a check or money order payable to the "United States Treasury."

- 1 tablespoon julienned fresh basil or parsley


Reheat grits in the microwave or over low heat, with additional liquid if necessary. Melt butter and/or olive oil in a saucepan, preferably non-stick. Add shrimp and sautŽ until just before they turn pink. Add tomato and stir until liquid exudes slightly, just a minute or so. Add garlic and cook briefly. Divide grits between 2 plates, pour shrimp and tomato mixture on top, garnish with basil or parsley and serve.

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Protecting Your Home: 10 Lo-Tech and Hi-Tech Tips

After a fun-filled week in the sun or on the slopes, the last thing families want to do is come home to a ransacked house. According to the National Burglar and Fire Alarm Association, each year nearly 5 million families become victims of household burglary, often when they've been on vacation.

Austin-based home security company uControl, a member of the National Burglar and Fire Alarm Association, shares 10 lo-tech and hi-tech security tips to protect your home while you're away:

Lo-Tech:

1. Discontinue newspaper and mail delivery.
2. Lock all doors, windows and garage doors.
3. Leave drapes and shades open as normal (closed blinds give burglars privacy should they break in).
4. Have your yard mowed and your trees and hedges trimmed – removing hiding places for burglars.

Hi-Tech:

5. Install motion-sensor lights in your yard so lights come on when someone walks by.

6. Install an alarm system – but not just any alarm system. Today's newer alarm services offer better security and more features and services, usually for the same (or lower) monthly fee.
7. Select a home security provider that offers redundant, back-up connections for your alarm system. Burglars know that all they have to do is cut the telephone line to disable most alarm systems. Newer security systems operate over broadband and cellular connections so your system is always monitored – whether a phone line is cut or your power goes off.
8. Make sure your home security is monitored 24/7 by licensed monitoring centers.
9. Select a security provider that provides remote access so you can check on your home anytime, anywhere. Many newer systems allow you to check on your home's alarm status from a computer or cell phone.
10. Set up your alarm system so you (and selected family members or neighbors) receive text messages or emails when the alarm goes off.
