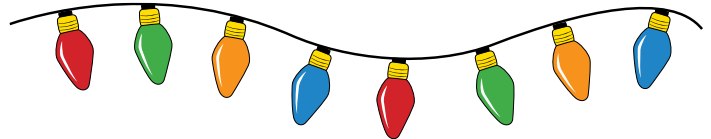
President's Corner

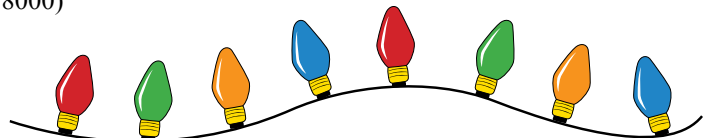

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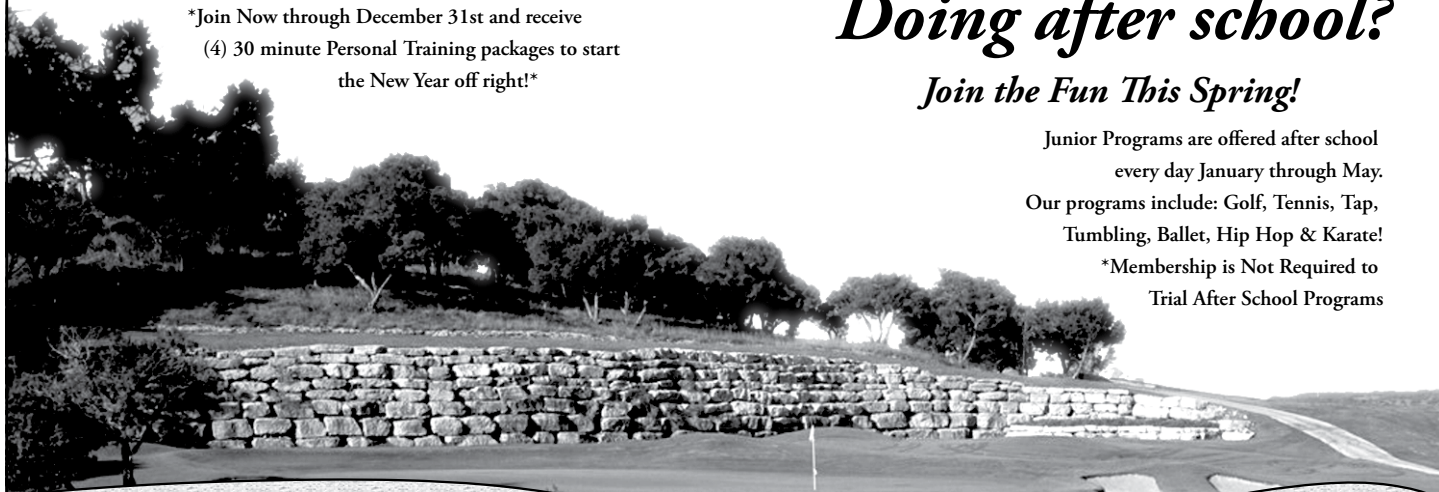
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Thinking about selling your home? Here are a few tips that will make your home simply irresistible!

Dispelling Common Myths of the Ashe Juniper

The Ashe juniper, more commonly known as the “cedar” tree, is not the bane of nature many people have come to believe. It is as much a part of the Texas Hill Country as wildflowers and limestone. The juniper tree can germinate on bare rock, quickly develop a thick canopy to protect the earth beneath it, and drop an enormous amount of leaf litter that can build soil and capture & hold water. Let’s explore some of the more common myths surrounding this tree, and in the process begin to appreciate its purpose, beauty, and wildness.

Myth #1: The “cedar” tree is not a native tree. While you have probably heard some of the tall tales about how junipers may have arrived in central Texas, the undisputable proof that they are native lies in fossilized juniper pollen found in our area, dating back to the last Ice Age. Additionally, in historical records dating back to the late 1600s and early 1700s, junipers are accurately described by Spanish trailblazers, missionaries, and other early settlers & explorers alike.

Myth #2: The “cedar” tree is a water hog. Scientific stemflow studies have shown that the juniper does not take in any more water than any other native woody plant its’ size. Junipers are extremely drought tolerant, and their dense canopy breaks the impact of falling rain. This allows a thick organic litter to accumulate under the juniper,

which slows down erosion and provides flash flood control. When slopes are clear-cut of juniper and native grasses cannot establish themselves, we not only lose our soil, but we may also be losing water. Eroded soil can fill the recharge cracks and limestone karsts with silt, which ultimately decreases the amount of water that percolates into the aquifer.

Myth #3: The “cedar” tree is a useless tree. One of our endangered species, the Golden-cheeked warbler, uses the soft bark strips of old-growth junipers to build its nest. Many other species of wildlife use juniper thickets as escape cover and shelter, and in the winter, its berries feed several species of birds and mammals. Butterfly larvae, such as the Great Purple Hairstreak & Juniper “Olive” Hairstreak, as well as the Tortricid or leafroller moths, all consume the foliage. And from a human point of view, oils provided by the juniper are used to scent perfumes and soaps, and the wood itself has been used for fuel, furniture, tools, fence posts, and just about everything in between.

Myth #4: Cutting down all the “cedar” trees in my yard will protect me from ‘cedar fever.’ December through March is the

height of 'cedar fever' season. This is the time of year that juniper trees (males only, the females produce the berries) produce copious amounts of pollen, up to several pounds per tree. Once this pollen becomes airborne, it travels hundreds of miles to reach every allergy sufferer. Let's face it – 'cedar fever' is simply a natural part of living in central Texas.

In short, the Ashe juniper helps us to define what we call "a sense of place." Combined with the wild and tumbled terrain created by our ubiquitous limestone, the character of the juniper's twisted limbs and the smell of its foliage in the deep summer heat defines the essence of the Texas Hill Country.

NEW HIKE AND BIKE TRAIL NEAR JESTER NOW OPEN

On Friday, November 9, 2007, the Bull Creek Foundation and the City of Austin Wildlands Conservation Division celebrated the official opening of the Matthew Smith trail on the Bull Creek Water Quality Protection Lands tract. This 1.5-mile hike and bike trail is the first to open on City of Austin Water Quality Protection Lands. The 60-acre Bull Creek tract, also known as the Stenis tract, was purchased with Bond funds after a successful 1998 election. Volunteers from the Bull Creek Foundation participated in a public process to define possible public uses for City water quality protection lands in 1999-2000 as part of an overall land management plan.

A memorandum of agreement between the foundation and the city was signed in 2003, followed a formal application permit process, which was finalized in late 2005, allowing trail construction to begin in January 2006. Thanks to countless hours contributed by volunteers, Eagle Scout and school projects, the trail is now open and will be maintained by volunteers from the Bull Creek Foundation. No dogs are permitted.

Directions to the trailhead and parking. Note - Parking is very limited. Traveling North on Loop 360 (from FM 2222) - Head north on Loop 360, you will pass through the traffic signal at Lakewood Drive. Move into the left lane and take a left at the next traffic signal at Spicewood Springs Road. Once on Spicewood Springs Rd, turn right onto the low water crossing road and take an immediate right into the parking lot area.

But the Welcome Committee needs your help ---

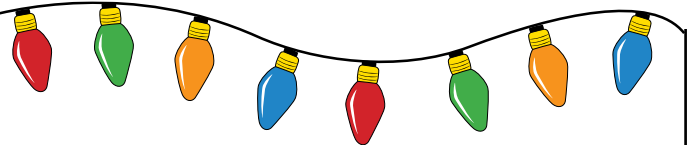

The Truth About Steroids

Steroid abuse is still on the rise, and not just among professional athletes and bodybuilders.

Despite numerous educational efforts by health care officials, many amateur and high school athletes looking for that elusive competitive edge still believe they can get it from a syringe or a bottle of pills. What they don't realize is that steroids will give them a lot more than they bargained for.

Not worth the risk

Acne. Liver damage. Increased risk of heart disease. These are just a few of the side effects associated with anabolic steroid abuse. And there's more.

The side effects are severe. Men who use steroids also may develop gynecomastia (the development of breasts), priapism (painful prolonged erection) and edema from sodium and water retention. They also will be more prone to cardiovascular problems since steroids decrease high-density lipoprotein levels (HDL) or "good" cholesterol, and increase low-density lipoprotein levels (LDL) or "bad" cholesterol.

Coupled with hypertension and negative changes in myocardial tissue, steroids users are at an increased risk for heart attack as well.

Of additional concern are alterations in psyche and behavior (i.e., aggression, physical dependence) and decreased immune function. Changes in the reproductive system, such as a reduction in testicle size, sperm count and mobility, and a decrease in the

levels of endogenous testosterone and other sex hormones are common.

Women at risk

Unlike men, whose side effects may be reversible once the abuse has stopped, women experience irreversible changes, such as a deepened voice, increased facial and body hair growth, enlarged clitoris and coarser skin. In addition, irregularities in, or cessation of menstrual cycle, increased libido, aggressiveness, acne and decreased immune function may occur.

Women are also prone to the cardiovascular risks and changes in psyche and behavior that men experience.



All risk, no glory

There is an even scarier risk of steroid abuse: death. Steroid users who share needles are putting themselves at risk for developing infections such as HIV, hepatitis or other viral diseases.

The terminal risks of steroid abuse are not fully known. Some published cases of tumors and other cancers related to steroid abuse have been reported. Even so, physicians and

researchers do not know all the repercussions of steroid abuse on one's body and future health.

Controlled research is unethical and only information from abusers is usable; yet this data may be inaccurate since most users are not forthcoming about the full extent of their steroid use.

Since the late 1980s, the federal government has begun to crack down on steroid use and distribution. Possession of steroids with intent to distribute without a valid prescription is a felony and subject to prosecution. Likewise, steroid use is a violation of the rules of virtually all sports leagues and councils as well as the traditional ethics of good sportsmanship.

No substitute for training

What most steroid users don't realize is that they are placing themselves at risk for something they could achieve on their own. Many experts agree that the effects of steroids on strength and muscle mass of beginning weight lifters or athletes are minimal when compared with the effects of an intensive weight-training or conditioning program.

The best way to improve performance and increase muscle mass is to follow a well-designed program that challenges both your body and your mind. No drug can do that for you.

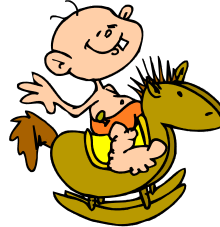

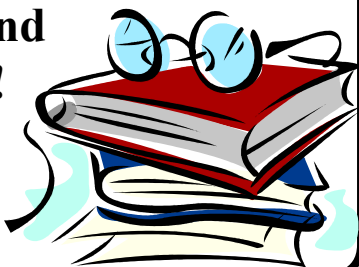
