PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.....

'A Little Off the Top' Please!

As the warming days of summer sneak up on Windermere Lakes, wise water use is important both environmentally and economically. Inefficient or ineffective sprinkler operation can waste a resource that is becoming environmentally valuable and more expensive.

To help maximize the efficiency of water use at your home, a pre-season sprinkler system check is very important. Of course, the common things to check for include sprinkler head operation and direction. Control system programming should be verified and the back-up battery in the control system should be checked or replaced. Set the timer control system to water just before dawn to reduce evaporation and increase absorption.

You should always avoid watering late in the evening or during the night to decrease the chance for fungus growth such as brown patch. The use of a rain sensor makes for a smart sprinkler system as the rain sensor turns the system off during times of frequent rain. The basic system checks can be completed without much trouble, and minor maintenance is usually a simple swap of low cost components purchased from the local home improvement store.

The wise use of water also requires efficient sprinkler head water distribution. Over time, shrubs, grass and hedges can grow up to obstruct the nozzle of a sprinkler head. Even though the sprinkler head is working correctly, the water is not being delivered to the full zone intended because of impact with vegetation. The resulting wet and dry spots in the yard or flower bed can cause plant stress which can later result in chinch bug damage and late summer dead spots. Take the time to watch each sprinkler head during its operation to see where the water stream impacts bushes, hedges and trees.

'A little off the top' or minor spring pruning of tall growth will insure optimal water distribution and delivery to help maintain a good looking yard.

TIPS & INFO FROM THE BOARD

Randy Lemmon's Lawn Fertilization Schedule For southern grasses including: St. Augustine, Bermuda and Zoysia

• **FERTILIZE** - four times a year:

Late February-Early March - apply a simple 15-5-10 for an early green-up. Most companies that make slow-release fertilizers also make a nonslow-release 15-5-10 that provides for a quick two-week green up before we get to the heart of the fertilizer schedule. Some people will be tempted to use a weed-and-feed at this time, but if you've been following the GardenLine herbicide schedule, there should never be a need. However, spot weed-and-feed treatments are recommended for those with turf-only landscapes or landscapes that have been established for many years. Warning: Most weed-and-feeds contain Atrizine which burns roots of young trees and shrubs. Late March-Early April - apply slow-release 3-1-2 ratio fertilizers. Recommended formulations:

19-4-10	Nitro Phos Super Turff
18-4-6	Fertilome Southwest Greenmaker
18-0-6	Fertilome's Zero Phosphate Formula
15-5-10	Southwest Fertilizer Premium Gold
19-5-9	Easy Gro Premium
21-5-10	Mr. C's (Cornelius brand)

Late June-Early July - apply slow-release 3-1-2 ratio fertilizers. (recommended formulations 19-5-9, 19-4-10, 18-4-6, 15-5-10.)

<u>October-November</u> - apply winterizer formulas for winter hardiness. Ratios vary, but make sure they are "winter" or "fall" formulas designed for southern grasses. (examples: 18-6-12, 8-12-16, 10-5-14) Will make lawns winter-hardy.

<u>June-September</u> - if turfgrass looks yellow (chlorosis) or necrotic, use an application of either granular or liquid iron. Once a year should be enough.

• **FUNGICIDE** - two times a year:

<u>July-September</u> - Gray Leaf Spot is a blotchy spot on the grass blade leafs. (mostly on St. Augustine lawns) Use fungicides with active ingredients like Daconil, Consan or Banner.

<u>September-October</u> - To control the dreaded Brownpatch fungal disease (symmetrical brown circles in the grass) you must prevent it from coming up with a systemic lawn fungicide with Bayleton, Terrachlor, Banner or Benomyl.

• **HERBICIDE** - three times a year:

(Pre-Emergent controls to prevent weeds)

Late October-Early November - Use two (2) different pre-emergent herbicides, to prevent the weeds that we experience in February and March. First is a pre-emergent with Portrait or Gallery for broadleaf weeds like clover. Second, use a pre-emergent with Amaze, Betasan, Balan or Treflan for grassy weeds like poa anna or annual bluegrass. There is also Barricade, Dimension or Pendimethlin as a 2-in-1 control.

<u>February-March</u> - Use the pre-emergent controls for grassy weeds again, to prevent such weeds as Crabgrass, Goosegrass and Dallisgrass from popping up late in the spring and summer. Again, use the grassy pre-emergent like Amaze, Betasan, Balan or Treflan. There is also Barricade, Dimension or Pendimethlin as a 2-in-1 control. <u>May-Early June</u> - One more application of a grassy pre-emergent like Amaze, Betasan, Balan, or Treflan will keep fall weeds from invading from August on. There is also Barricade, Dimension-based or Pendimethlin as a 2-in-1 control.

Irrigation Basics — The How's, Why's And When's Of Watering

How much and how often should you water your grass? Sounds like a pretty basic question, but the answer isn't a simple one. Irrigation and watering needs are dependant on many factors — the kind of grass you have, your soil profile, mowing height, and the kind of irrigation system or sprinkler system you have. Plus, of course, what Mother Nature doles out.

This basic irrigation schedule takes into consideration temperatures and rainfall: Normally, turf and landscapes in this area do fine with $1-1\frac{1}{2}$ inches per seven-day week when daytime temperatures are in the 70s and 80s.

As daytime highs hit 88-92, you can probably up that to $1-1\frac{1}{2}$ inches every four to five days.

When temperatures exceed 93 degrees consistently (normally July-August), you should probably water every two to three days.

The kind of grass you have is also very important. St. Augustine needs the most water, Bermuda the next most, and Zoysia far less than the previous two.

Your soil, however, is ultimately the most critical factor. Clay or sandy soils not very well enriched with organic matter definitely need more water because they dry out quicker.

Water early in the morning. That's when water pressure is best, there's less wind to evaporate the moisture, and the turf will have a store of water for the warm day ahead. If you have an automatic sprinkler, schedule it to run between 3 and 8 a.m. If you don't have an automatic system, start the sprinkler when you first get up. If you water at night, you run the risk of suffering fungal diseases like brownpatch.

How do you determine how much time it takes for your system to put out an inch of water? Place an empty tuna or cat food can at the farthest point the spray pattern reaches. When it fills up, that's how long it takes. Depending on the system, the time can range from 15-45 minutes.

If it seems some of your neighbors don't run their sprinklers as much as you, it could be they have more organic matter in their soil. Rich, organic soil doesn't happen overnight, though ... enriched topsoil or soil activators need to be added consistantly each year.

Finally, if you aren't mowing as tall as your lawnmower will allow, make the change today. Tall grass in good soil develops deeper roots which draw a larger volume of deep moisture, requiring less supplemental irrigation. Plus, lawns mowed tall provide shade for the soil surface.

There is one caveat to all of the above, however. Newly sodded lawns need to be watered on a daily basis during the heat of the summer. Keep the "mud" wet under the root zone so it will break down and allow the roots to establish in the soil below. Don't drown the new sod ... just keep it moist enough to soften the soil and help the roots grow down.

SECURITY TIPS

Here are some tips from various sources to keep your home safe and secure....

- Close and lock all doors and windows even if you're leaving for only a short time. Dead-bolt locks and reinforced door frames are recommended.
- Use automatic timers on lights, radio and/or TV to give the impression someone is home, or just leave a radio playing, and a light on, when you are not at home.
- Install motion-sensitive or low-voltage lighting around your house.
- Lock up ladders, tools, and other items which might be used to gain entry to your house.
- Keep trees and shrubs pruned to eliminate hiding places.
- Install door and window alarms.
- Install lock pins on windows, and a "charlie bar" on sliding glass doors.
- Don't let strangers into your house for any reason and don't leave repairmen or technicians alone in your home.
- Never leave a key outside, no matter how clever you think your hiding place is.
- Display your house number so it can be seen even at night in case the police need to find your house quickly.

- If you plan to be away for a while, ask the police to patrol more closely, be sure to stop mail and newspaper deliveries, get a neighbor to watch for and remove flyers or other junk that may accumulate by your door, and be sure your lawn is taken care of.
- Keep valuable items in a safe-deposit box and keep a good inventory of your possessions.
- Buy lockable wheel nuts for your car. Always lock your car, and don't leave money, cell phones, or valuables in plain sight.
- Keep an eye on the neighborhood, especially those folks who are home during the day.

Remember, if you should see any persons you believe to be suspicious and/or that do not appear to belong in our neighborhood, please report so they can be checked out by the proper authorities.
