The same Secura Card assigned to your address for the tennis courts and fitness center also opens the access gate at this pool. Please keep the Bent Creek Pool gate locked at all times and do not prop it open. We rely heavily on homeowners to monitor and report vandalism and pool misuse.

Streetlight Outages

Lighting the way for drivers and pedestrians, streetlights are vital to our everyday lives. We appreciate your help in identifying lights that are malfunctioning or in need of repair. The sooner Oncor knows they are out, the sooner we can get them fixed!

Per Public Utility Commission of Texas rules, Oncor has 15 days to complete a repair once notified, however we strive to complete standard repairs (burned out bulbs, photocells) in 5 days or less.

Also, don't forget-safety first! We appreciate your help, but it is important that you do not put yourself in harm's way when noting street light outages. 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Call *DPS (asterisk 377) Advice from the Southlake DPS

For Non-Life Threatening Situations on the Road The Texas Department of Public Safety and four wireless carriers have established *DPS, a statewide wireless phone number for Texas motorists to use when reporting non-life-threatening situations on Texas roads and highways.

Customers of participating wireless companies – ALLTEL, Nextel, Cingular Wireless, and Verizon Wireless - can dial *DPS (asterisk 377) free of airtime charges anywhere in Texas and receive roadside assistance for non-emergency situations. Similar to the DPS Roadside Assistance number, 1-800-525-555, callers may quickly contact a DPS representative who will dispatch a State Trooper, other peace officer or appropriate assistance to the scene. Examples of when a motorist should dial *DPS (asterisk 377) include: stranded with car problems, hazardous road conditions, or suspicious activity at a rest area. Calls to *DPS are answered 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and are free of airtime charges courtesy of the wireless carriers. *DPS is not intended to replace 911 as an emergency number; emergency calls should always be directed to 911. Although*DPS is intended for non-emergency calls, any emergency calls reported to the *DPS number will be handled by DPS operators, who would contact local law enforcement agencies for assistance. 

The Many Faces of Mood Lighting Submitted by Kirsten Hanna

The term "mood lighting" usually conjures up images of candlelit dinners, soft tones and romance... but there are lots of moods! Typically, a space should have several lighting options to allow you to choose the combination of lights to suit a particular purpose, such as reading or having a dinner party. But beyond the tasks that lighting schemes enable, there are some distinct moods worth exploring:

- * Romantic the classic of mood lighting... but let's dissect how it works. Soft lights at or below eye-level when seated are key - this is usually achieved with candles, but accent table lamps with a dimmer switch do the trick just as well. Warm tones in the orange family are especially flattering, and can be achieved by a combination of a lowwatt bulb on a dimmer with a lampshade made of natural material.
- * Conversant So a few friends have come over for appetizers and drinks... what kind of lighting can get the party started? The number of people and size of the room impact how many watts you need, but the main tip is to beware of creating hot-spots. If there is a high-watt lamp next to a guest, turn it down or move it to the perimeter of the room – it is uncomfortable to be blinded every time you turn to speak to someone, and it takes the focus away from the conversation. Likewise, dark-spots with little light coverage leave people feeling... well, like they are in the dark.
- * Industrious You have your "To Do" list, your stack of papers and your game-face on. Maybe it's time to tackle those bills, or just a healthy stack of magazines, but you're feeling industrious. Light it up! If you have a great view (great enough to distract you) pull those shades and turn up the task lighting.

When fluorescents are the only light source (like many offices and stores) they can cause headaches due to the constant, almost imperceptible flicker... but when combined with incandescents in a living space they can provide just the right amount of focused light to help keep you focused. A bright bulb can reflect off a computer screen, but a well-positioned desk lamp can help cut down on eye strain and help you finish in no time.

These are just a few simple tips to help you create the perfectly lit space. Because lighting is only a part of completed and finished 'look', do not forget to consider textures and colors as well.



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
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A Hyperactive Nightmare on Two Legs Does This Sound Like Your Child?

Screaming fits, temper tantrums, hyperactive, letters home from school, lack of focus, antisocial and unacceptable behavior. Is your child? I so understand your situation. My young daughter can be a big pain depending on what she has consumed.

There could be a very simple solution to these behavioral issues. It is now widely accepted that food additives and delayed patterns of food allergies play an important role in causing learning and behavioral problems both in children and adults. A huge number of convenience foods contain a number of preservatives and colorants that have an adverse effect on some individuals, especially the young.

So what's the answer? Some suggest you cut out a whole range of foods and drinks such as all dairy products, yellow foods, junk food, all food with colorants, fried foods, soda and fruit juices for 2 weeks. You will then need to slowly reintroduce each of them and monitor any behavioral differences, but I know if I did this, my little one would be packing her bags and moving in with the neighbors.

I suggest the first step is to keep a food and behavior diary with time lines for 2 weeks to allow you to monitor what is drunk and eaten along with any personality changes. If you see a link between certain foods or drinks with a change in behavior, check all the ingredients and see if there is a common theme, then avoid, to a degree, foods

containing those ingredients. It would be a bit harsh saying your child can't eat birthday cake because of all the colorants, but you can do as I do and just think ahead and be prepared for the fallout.

Although every one is different the most common causes of food intolerance are colorants such as sunset yellow (E110), carmoisine (E122), tartrazine (E102), allura red (E129) and also products such as soda's, energy drinks and even those 'healthy' fruit drinks that contain lots of sugar.

Although it's hard it is to limit their favorite foods, it helps if once you have discover what might be affecting them try a similar alternative to their favorite munchie, but without those problem additives. Whilst this maybe time consuming it can be done. You will then need to educate them to avoid the 'bad' foods. If you are a busy parent or just need some help to put you in the right direction it is worth contacting diet and nutrition specialists. They can help by analyzing the diet and then going on a super market run with you to work out the 'good options'.

Now as the first option in fighting behavioral problems many parents and individuals are looking at what is consumed rather than opting for drugs as the only solution.

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


