As we approach a new year, all residents should have received their Pine Brook Annual Assessment of \$379 and the Clear Lake City Blvd Assessment of \$80, in the mail in November 2009. These are two separate annual assessments set by the Boards of the respective associations and levied on all homeowners of Pine Brook by Deed Restrictions.

The \$80 Boulevard Assessment is levied on all residents of Pine Brook, North Fork and Bay Pointe by the developers of Clear Lake City. The funds are used to maintain the center median from Highway 3 to Middle Brook Drive and the set backs of Bay Pointe, North Fork and Pine Brook. These assessments are due December 31 and delinquent January 31, 2010.

Residents are reminded that delinquent assessments incur a penalty and interest. Please contact CIA Services as soon as possible if you need assistance with your payments. As a reminder, please do not wait to the last minute to pay the assessments on line by credit card as sometimes postings are delayed and interest and penalties accrue Feb. 1, 2010.

The Pine Brook Wetland Restoration Project has benefited from several scout projects: Eagle Scout Project by James MacLean, built

James MacLean, built and installed nest boxes with predator guards, to enhance nesting habitat for woodpeckers, screech

owls, wrens, and chickadees (Troop 957)

- Eagle Scout Project by Scott Bowen, restored the wettest areas by removing debris to increase depth, and planted 350 blooming native aquatic plants. (Troop 848)
- Eagle Scout Project by Eric Macke to remove tallows in native prairie and enhance with the prairie with 450 relocated native grasses. (Troop 389)
- Girl Scout Project (Troop 7140) helped divide, water, grow, and plant native Eastern Gamma grasses.

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Pine Bark Beetle Update

In the last issue, it was reported that as of October 2009, Pine Bark beetles had not been found on our park trees, although many pines have died due to stress related to Hurricane Ike wind damage and a 2-year drought.

Several residents have reported that Pine Bark beetles have been found on their pines and that they had had to remove them.

Watch your trees carefully – the beetles move about frequently and are attracted to live trees under stress. If concerned, consider the advice of a professional tree arborist.



Monarch Butterfly Rescue

There may be many unknown "heroes" among us, but to one Monarch Butterfly there are 2 heroes to whom



she owes her life!

The Guenthers often spot check the Goode's Monarch caterpillars, releasing new butterflies as they hatch from chrysalis, in an area protected from the highly in-

vasive Bahaman brown anoles (that unfortunately have gobbled up our native green anoles).

As the Goode's left for vacation they pointed sadly to a chrysalis in a nearby brick, "The caterpillar may hatch as a crippled butterfly and never fly - as there is no way for it to dry its wings."

With a 100% chrysalis hatching success rate so far, this seemed only to challenge Wolfgang and Gustav Guenther. The brick was carried into the kitchen and

watched day and night. Then a decision was made to carefully remove the chrysalis from the brick and watch it in a container with a soft bottom. From grocery store to piano lesson, the chrysalis was constantly under watch. In the car the chrysalis began to turn transparent and spilt. Once home, Wolfgang carefully watched it until the butterfly could climb into his hand. He placed it on a limb to dry its wings. This photo is the success story!

The Goodes and Guenthers have safely "hatched" over 80 Monarch butterflies so far this year! Help the Monarchs by planting 5 or more milkweeds in your yard. Now is the time for their multi-generational migration to the mountains and oyamel firs of central Mexico. Each butterfly has only 7-15 days to find a Milkweed and lay eggs before she dies. If she doesn't find it - her generation will be the last to survive the migration.

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
