# HOA FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q: How many homes are located in the Meadows of Brushy Creek HOA?

A: 655 homes and 1 vacant lot.

Q:Where can I find the HOA By-Laws and Declarations?

A: The complete set of By-laws and deed restrictions can be found on our website. www. meadowshoa.com.

Q: What events does the HOA sponsor?

A: Yard of the month, Spring and Fall garage sales, Christmas light contest and an annual BBQ cook-off.

Q: How can I be a part of the association?

A: The board has an annual meeting every year that is announced at least 30 days prior. At this meeting all board members are elected and every homeowner is invited to attend and be a part of the next board. Committees are formed from time to time as well.

Q: What are the most common complaints that the HOA receives?

A: Trash containers stored in public view, RVs and boats stored on premises for long periods of time. Trash containers should only be visible from the front of a house on trash day.

RV's and boats are not supposed to be parked in driveways or along streets over night. This is probably are second biggest complaint. We take into consideration, the fact that RV's need to packed and unpacked before trips and boats require preparation before and after they are placed in the water. We ask each of our neighbors to confine these activities to a few days.

Q: My mailing address is Austin, TX, why don't I receive City of Austin Services like Police, Fire and library services?

A: Street addresses were set in the 1970's to accommodate mail delivery only with expectations that eventually ours and our surrounding neighborhoods would be annexed by either the City of Austin or Round Rock. There are no pending annexation plans.

Q: When are HOA meetings held?

A: 4th Tuesday of the month, 7:00PM, Brushy Creek Community Center, 16318 Great Oaks Dr., Round Rock, TX, 78681. An annual meeting is held every year. 30 days written notice of the annual meeting is mailed to each homeowner.

Q: Where do I obtain information concerning Architectural specifications?

A: You may also obtain information and forms at www.meadowshoa.com.

Q: How long do I have to finish the construction once my plans have been approved by the Architectural Control Committee?

A: You are required to complete your project within 12 months after receiving written

### **FIRE ANTS**

This is a new twist to killing fire ant colonies that I haven't tried yet. For those not familiar with Walter Reeves, he is from the University of Georgia agriculture department specializing in home gardening. His television show gardening in Georgia is on each Saturday. I know fire ants are picky eaters and any type poison that is effective takes seven feeding steps before the queen receives it.

Plus, if the bait is stored in close proximity to any petroleum or fertilizer products they won't touch it. Contact poisons that are on the market just cause the colony to move away. A well-developed colony can be as deep as 30 feet and spread out some 20 to 50 feet from the mound center. This has been documented by studies done in the early 60's when they were first sited in South Alabama.

An environmentally friendly cure for fire ants has been announced by Walter Reeves on his Georgia Gardener radio program:
Simply pour two cups of CLUB SODA (carbonated water) directly in the center of a fire ant mound.
The carbon dioxide in the water is heavier than air and displaces the oxygen, which

suffocates the queen and the other ants. The whole colony will be dead within about two days.

Here's the good side - club soda leaves no poisonous residue, does not contaminate the ground water, and does not indiscriminately kill other insects. Not harmful to your pets, soaks into the ground. Each mound must be treated individually and a one-liter bottle of club soda will kill 2 to 3 mounds.

approval from the Architectural Control Committee (ACC). If not completed within that time, please contact the ACC and request an extension.

Q: Who do I call to report an annoying barking dog?

A: We have all been faced with this one. Folks leave their house and their dogs bark incessantly until their return. Often times, the pet owner has no idea how much of a nuisance their dogs has caused because it ceases the moment they return home. If the issue can't be resolved by a knock on your neighbor's door, Williamson County Sheriff is our primary law enforcement agency. Their non-emergency phone number is 943-1300.

Q: What happens if I don't pay my HOA annual assessment (HOA dues)?

A: You HOA dues are not voluntary and should be treated as any other bill and be paid promptly. Past due balances accrue interest and must be paid in full prior to refinancing or sale of the property.

Q: How do I report a streetlight that is out?

A: Streetlight outages may be reported online at OncorStreetLight.com. Oncor asks that you provide basic contact information in case they need additional information or clarification so that they can locate and repair the light quickly. You can also report a streetlight outage by phone by calling 1.888.313.4747.

Per Public Utility Commission of Texas rules, Oncor has 15 days to complete a repair once notified, however, standard repairs like burned out bulbs and photocells are usually repaired in 5 days or less


# What Is Recyclable?

### Landscape Lady: February

Question of the Month:

Do I need to cover plants during the winter? If so, what do I use to cover them?

Landscape Lady Says:



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My first recommendation, try to select plant materials that can withstand temperatures down to 25 degrees (occasionally happens!) although sometimes we have that special plant for that special spot and it will need to be covered. In Central Texas, Bougainvillea, citrus (lemons/oranges) and even some tender, seasonal color (Cyclamen) need

to be covered during periods of extended low temperatures. You should never use plastic as this retains moisture and daytime heat which will cause your plants to bake/get moldy.

At home, you can use a sheet or light blanket to cover plants. Use rocks/bricks to hold corners down during windy times. The best material to use is freeze cloth because it is lightweight and specifically designed to protect plants during cold nights. This can be found at local retail nurseries.

Plant of the Month

Looking around the landscape right now (Brrrr!) for something that has survived the cold, wet, cold, wind, cold, etc.? One tough cookie is Rosemary. It comes in 2 growth forms. First, upright Rosemary can be allowed to grow big/

bushy (some claim the plant can reach 5' in height, but that's not typical). It can also be tightly trimmed in various shapes. Second, prostrate, or trailing, rosemary tends to spread horizontally although it still will reach 18" in height. These plants are green/gray,

January- it's a time for simple evaluations and easy techniques that could lead to long-term landscape success. First, we get a chance



to observe our landscapes in bare form. We can now see what may need to be pruned. If you haven't already cutback perennials that have frozen back, now is the time. The late winter months are also the best time to prune large canopy trees as well as new wood flowering trees. Along with cool weather, our cool season rains provide a great opportunity to ensure proper drainage in each part of the landscape.

The summer months won't seem so dry if you will prepare now. Looking

for ways to lower maintenance needs and improve overall landscape value and beauty? Winter is a great time to install hardscape features as the low temperatures and dormant plants help to buffer any new formed stress to your landscape.

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### EAT RIGHT TIP OF THE MONTH TIPS FOR EATING OUT

Food choices away from home are important to your health and weight because many of us are eating more meals away from home. Fortunately, making healthful and delicious choices in restaurants is also easier today. Restaurants of all types are responding to customers' desires with more options in portion sizes, preparation methods and menu items:

- More appetizer-size portions of popular entrées
- More baked and broiled choices in meat, fish and poultry
- More fruit and vegetables side orders to substitute for fries.

#### Hit the Bricks

Make physical activity part of dining out. All you need is a comfortable pair of shoes:

- Walk from Home or the Office. Pick a restaurant that's a 10- or 15-minute walk away. You'll get your meal and 30 minutes of physical activity and avoid the parking hassles.
- Walk with Family or Friends. Get moving as a group before or after eating. A brisk walk before a meal gives you time to chat. A stroll afterward helps your digestion.

 Walk Up Instead of Driving Thru. Park your car in the lot and walk inside to get your fast food order. And make fast food an occasional treat rather than a daily habit.

### **Right-Size Your Serving Sizes**

- Becoming sensible about serving sizes is an important way to maintain a healthy weight and it's good for your wallet too.
- Instead of a large entrée, order an appetizer and a leafy green salad or choose two appetizers for a meal.
- Start with a small serving like a cup of soup, a junior burger or a small order of fries. If you are still hungry, order something else.
- Indulge your inner child: Order a kid's meal at a fast-food restaurant. Many now offer a choice of low-fat milk and fruits or vegetables instead of fries.
- Savor your steak twice as much. Eat half at the restaurant, then
  take the other half home to enjoy sliced onto a green salad or
  as a sandwich on whole-grain bread.

food into the container for a second meal. That's two meals for the price of one.

- Share from start to finish. Order one appetizer for the whole table and then order one dessert with multiple forks. Sometimes, just a bite or two is perfect.
