SUMMERWOOD TO OPEN

New Model Home Village

The new Model Home Village and Information Center opening this spring in Summerwood signals a very active year ahead for the community.

Opening in early March at its new location on Hunters Lake Way, the Model Home Village will initially showcase new decorated models by Lennar, Village Builders, Partners In Building, and J. Patrick Homes. Brighton Homes, the newest member of the Summerwood homebuilder team, has also started construction of its new model in the village.

The Summerwood Information Center will also be relocated to a cul-desac island in front of the model homes. While the information center will continue to offer the same welcoming and informative environment, there will be a new emphasis on the Information Center staff spending more time in the community, interacting with home shoppers and residents in the model homes and amenities, as well as at special events.

"Summerwood was one of the first communities in the Houston area to introduce the concept of a Model Home Village, with all builders and price ranges grouped close together for convenient one-stop shopping," said Jennifer Taylor, vice president of marketing for Newland Communities. "We are very excited to open our second Model Home Village to showcase our new lineup of homebuilders, and their latest floor plans and designs."

The opening of the Model Home Village and Information Center is the first of several exciting developments planned for Summerwood in 2010, Taylor said.

"In the coming weeks, we plan to announce two additional builders who will be adding more variety to the new-home offerings in Summerwood," she said. 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CRIME WATCH NEWS

The Summerwood Crime Watch Committee was formed by a group of concerned residents of our community and the group meets on the second Tuesday of the month at Community Central. Some would ask what a neighborhood watch program is and what they do. Neighborhood Watch is a crime prevention program that enlists the active participation of residents in cooperation with law enforcement to reduce crime, solve problems, and improve the quality of life. With the combined efforts of our local MUD's, our HOA, and county officials, we are fortunate to have three contracted officers who patrol our community. Equally important, these officers are partners who help in the fight against crime in Summerwood. They work closely with the CWC and are actively involved in our events and our meetings. We have also forged partnerships with other law enforcement agencies such as HPD. Since some residents live within the patrol district of HPD, our HCSO contract deputies share a squad car that is equipped with both county and city dispatch radios. This allows them to be more involved and proactive in deterring crime. At least one of our officers tries to be present at each of our meetings, but the CWC has direct contact with these officers as well. It truly is a partnership.

At a recent meeting, not only were our deputies represented, but members of the Harris County Auto Theft division were on-hand to give us some tips for auto safety. They say:

- 1. **Take Your Keys**. One out of every five vehicles stolen had the keys
- 2. Lock Your Car. Approximately half of all vehicles stolen were left unlocked.
- 3. Never Hide a Second Set of Keys in Your Car. Extra keys can easily be found if a thief takes time to look.
- 4. Park in Well-Lighted Areas.
- 5. Park in Attended Lots. Auto thieves do not like witnesses and prefer unattended parking lots.
- 6. If You Park in an Attended Lot, Leave Only the Ignition/Door Key. If your trunk and glove box use the same key as the door, have one of them changed. Don't give the attendant easy access to your glove box and trunk. Upon returning, check the tires, spare and battery to insure they are the same as those you had when you parked.
- 7. Never Leave Your Car Running, Even if You'll Only Be Gone for a Minute. Vehicles are commonly stolen at convenience stores, gas stations, ATM's, etc. Many vehicles are also stolen on cold

POOL COMMITTEE NOTES....

With all the recent cold weather it may be hard to imagine that anyone could possibly want to discuss pool maintenance and swimming lessons, much less until ten or eleven o'clock on a given Thursday evening. However, this is what your Summerwood Pool Committee has been doing. Yes Virginia, there is a Summerwood Pool Committee--- a motley crew of seven voting members who are passionate about sparkling water, attractive and functional pool features (including pool decks free of duck eggs) and pool safety. And, whether or not Punxsutawney Phil sees his shadow this February, "Swim at Your Own Risk" will commence at Central Pool March 1, 2010.

This season the Central Pool will take delivery of new furniture matching the old; some of which was lost due to wear and some which has walked away. Thus, we will be installing new "dusk to dawn" security lighting to protect our investment and amenities. We will also be closing the pools at 9:00 PM this season as the incidences of vandalism have been shown to occur past that time.

The Pool Committee's primary purpose is to make recommendations to the HOA (Home Owners Association) regarding our aquatic

amenities. The committee formed in the middle of last season when residents spoke up to say our pools are a tremendous asset and need more oversight. Whether talking about wrist band allocation, restrooms or the baby pool that needs resurfacing, improvements are needed. One recommendation the Pool Committee made this year was to seek pool management bids. We are currently in the second round of the bidding process with four finalists. We are also looking for our pool management company to offer professionally managed, Red Cross certified swim lessons. The Pool Management Company for 2010-2011 will be announced sometime next month.

More information will be coming soon about the 2010 Pool Schedule. Parents, be on the lookout for the return of our Summerwood Stingrays! Swim Team registration starts April 5th in the Central Pool Clubhouse. Please see their Website: www. summerwoodstingrays.com. Go Stingrays! In the meantime, have a suggestion? 

mornings when the owner leaves the vehicle running to warm up. Leaving your key in an unattended motor vehicle is a crime in Texas punishable by a fine of up to \$200.

- 8. Completely Close Car Windows When Parking. Don't make it any easier for the thief to enter your vehicle.
- 9. **Don't Leave Valuables in Plain View**. Don't make your car a more desirable target for thieves by leaving valuables in plain sight

These are great ideas to use not only when out and about town, but when at home as well. We did see a spike in overnight crime in our community, most of which involved burglaries of vehicles... usually ones left open or with valuables in plain sight. With all the combined efforts, I am relieved to report that arrests have been made. Nonetheless, we must be vigilant and proactive. If you have not seen your block captain, you may not have one. The CWC is continually and actively recruiting block captains and members and we encourage anyone interested to attend an upcoming meeting, to email the CWC chairman at david.myrick@sbcglobal.net, or to log on to summerwoodlife.com and join the Crime Watch group. We are only as strong and effective as our members.

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





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COULD YOUR CHILD BE AT RISK

For Sudden Cardiac Death?

Does your child suffer from fainting spells? Or chest pain and shortness of breath during exercise? Your child or a young person you know may be at risk for sudden cardiac death due to an inherited heart condition (a SADS condition). Many people who suffer from SADS feel healthy and have absolutely no idea that something might be wrong until it's too late. However, a few warning signs and symptoms may cause you to think twice...

YOUR CHILD SHOULD SEE A DOCTOR IF SHE/HE HAS:

- A family history of unexplained, sudden death in a young person (under age 40)—including drowning suddenly
- Fainting (syncope) or seizure during exercise, excitement, or following a startle
- Consistent or unusual chest pain and/or shortness of breath during exercise

These may be signs of a serious heart condition that must be immediately addressed by a physician.

About 716,000 people in the US are affected by SADS conditions right now—and they may not know it. These conditions include

Long QT Syndrome, Hypertrophic Cardiomyopathy (HCM), Brugada Syndrome, and others. These conditions are hereditary and, therefore, more than one family member will be at risk. It is extremely important that all family members be tested once one family member is diagnosed.

WHAT THE SADS FOUNDATION RECOMMENDS

1. Every child should have a risk assessment history at regular intervals: preschool, before/during middle school, before/during high school and before participation in organized sports.

The Sudden Arrhythmia Death Syndrome (SADS) Foundation offers a simple, comprehensive risk assessment form "Pediatric Sudden Cardiac Death Risk Assessment Form" that you can download from our web site (www.sads.org).

2. Every school should have an emergency plan in place which includes a plan for cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). An automated external defibrillator (AED) in schools is vital. Getting to a person within 3 to 5 minutes is especially important.

- 3. All high school students should be trained in CPR and AED as a requirement for graduation.
- 4. Everyone should be aware of the warning signs that may indicate someone is at risk for a sudden cardiac arrest:

The SADS Foundation wants to make sure that each child grows up happy and healthy! Please fill out the risk assessment form for your child (available on our website at www. sads.org or at 1-800-STOP SAD) If he/she answers "yes" to any of



the questions, please have your physician check your child's heart. If you want to know more about getting an AED in your school—or about SADS, please let us know.

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
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Sudoku

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
