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West Harris County MUD No. 9 Awarded Federal Grant for Bang Elementary Safe Routes To School Funding

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) recently released its list of Safe Routes to School's (SRTS) grant recipients for 2009-2010. West Harris County MUD No. 9 (WHCMUD 9), in partnership with Ramona Bang Elementary School in the Cypress-Fairbanks Independent School District, was among the distinguished recipients. The federal grant award is one of only two infrastructure grants to the TxDOT Houston District for the SRTS program. The grant was awarded for the maximum amount of \$500,000.

Through its civil engineer, Edminster Hinshaw Russ & Associates (EHRA), WHCMUD 9 pursued the grant on behalf of the school, which is located within the district's boundaries. The sidewalks, crosswalks and trail system proposed to be funded with the grant will interconnect with the existing sidewalks within the district to provide a route for students to walk to school with less exposure to vehicular traffic. The walkway system is a component of WHCMUD 9's comprehensive Parks and Trails Master Plan (PTMP) prepared by EHRA. Chris Browne, EHRA's Department Manager of Land Planning and Landscape Architecture, said "EHRA prepared the SRTS plan and grant application as part of their services to the district. The award of this grant means that WHCMUD 9 and Cy-Fair ISD can continue working together to implement the trails plan to the benefit of the entire community." The project will consist of a multi-use trail and possibly a pedestrian bridge along White Oak Bayou providing greater and safer access to the school from within the community. Vice-president of WHCMUD 9, Jeff Ottmann, noted that the District's Board of Directors is appreciative of the efforts of EHRA and their involvement with Cy-Fair ISD and the community.

WHCMUD 9 recently completed the construction of new walking trails, benches and landscaping along West Road in a recent phase of its PTMP. The SRTS grant award will supplement the available funds for the next phase of the PTMP, which is planned to expand the existing trail system.

SRTS is a federally funded program designed to connect children safely to their local schools by providing funding for infrastructure projects, pedestrian and bike education as well as safety improvements and programs for schools. Administered on the state level by TxDOT, SRTS aims to empower communities to make walking and bicycling to school a safe and routine activity.

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Winchester Trails THE HISTORY OF THE LUMINARY

Down through the ages, light from fire has served as a destination beacon for weary travelers. Two thousand years ago, shepherds marked the way to the manger of the Christ Child with small bonfires. For centuries, to symbolize this tradition, the people of Mexico have gathered on Christmas Eve to light large bonfires in the village commons, to pray, sing and welcome the Christ Child. After the celebration, smaller bonfires were built in front of each home to welcome the Baby Jesus. During the 19th century in northern New Mexico, these bonfires were made from criss-crossed pinon sticks to light the path to their homes. Early in the 20th century, one family had been unable to adequately prepare the traditional home bonfire because of illness in their family. As the holiday season drew near, the youngest child placed a broken candle in a paper bag, partially filled with sand, and placed it outside their home to keep the tradition and welcoming spirit alive. These "little lights" or farolitos have become one of the most popular ways for people to extend this custom to the present day.

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Winchester Trails GREENTHUMB CORNER

It's time to get ready for the fall growing season, when the cooler weather makes yard work more of a pleasure and less of a chore. It doesn't matter if your preference is for shrubbery, flowers, fruit, vegetable or herb growing - the calendar for this month includes "action items" for all of us, and the first hint of lower temperatures makes it a lot easier to get them accomplished.

Our lawns are surviving the heat pretty well this year, probably because our cumulative rainfall is running a few inches ahead of normal, but it's a good idea to give the grass a boost with a light application of fertilizer. Water generously to avoid fertilizer burn.

It's hard to beat chrysanthemums for early fall color. In pots on the patio or as permanent perennials in the beds, they are an excellent addition to any yard. They should be fertilized every two or three weeks until flower buds appear, then weekly until the buds show color. Water as necessary. For best garden display, pinch out the center bud of each cluster (but if you want to produce "show quality" blooms with the large-flowered type, leave the center bud and pinch off all laterals).

Keep the roses well mulched, well fed and well watered, and they can reward you with fall blooms that may be even better than spring and summer. Cut out dead wood. As cool weather approaches, water in the morning to discourage black spot and mildew, and maintain a regular spray schedule to prevent black spot from entering leaf tissue. Check azaleas for soil acidity and keep well mulched.

Now is a good time to get started on digging up and dividing perennials like day lilies, iris, violets and cannas. And if you want to start a bed of perennials, this is the time of year to think about planting from seed or nursery transplants. Just make sure the bed is well prepared with lots of organic material mixed in, because it's not going to get the benefit of the same regular cultivation as the beds of annuals. Also consider taking cuttings of tender plants such as coleus and geranium; root them in pots to carry over to next spring.

After the first cool spell, clean up the beds and dispose of old stalks and dead leaves which may harbor insects and diseases - you can add them to the compost heap, where the heat generated by decomposition is enough to kill most pathogens.

September is also an ideal time to start a small herb garden - you can plant chives, parsley, coriander (cilantro), rosemary, dill and garlic. It needn't take much space, and the results can be very decorative and aromatic as well as useful in the kitchen.

This is a busy month in the vegetable garden if you want to take advantage of the fall growing season. If you hurry, you may not be too late for broccoli, cauliflower, brussel sprouts and tomatoes, and

you can plant cabbage and collards for winter greens. And it's time to seed the root crops like carrots, beets, onions, leeks, turnips and radishes. Prepare the beds with the addition of lots of organic material (compost, mulch or peat moss), and make sure that the soil is well cultivated to a depth of twelve inches or more, especially for the carrots. Try lettuce as the weather cools down. One advantage of the fall garden is that the pests are usually far less active than in the spring, so give it a try - you'll find it's well worth the effort when you savor the freshness and flavor of home-grown produce.

THIS MONTH'S TIP: If you've been thinking about establishing a strawberry bed, get started now by preparing raised beds with lots of pine bark mulch so that you'll be ready to plant in October.
