

# **TALKING TRASH: Recycling Weighs on the Bottom Line**

We may love our gas at the low prices we've been experiencing, but everyone forgets that oil affects many other industries including recycling. It is becoming increasingly harder for waste companies to cover the cost of processing. For example, low oil prices make new plastic cheaper to make than using recycled plastic. In addition, commodity prices are affected and they have been going down for over a year, resulting in waste companies being unable to cover the costs of collection and processing of recyclables. Slow economic growth in China has also contributed to lower prices for recycled metals.

Most of us probably don't realize some of the issues involved in the recycling process. For example: glass causes problems by damaging sorting machines while it is sold at very low prices. Consumer Confusion over what to put in recycling carts/bins makes recycling more expensive. Companies spend more money removing nonrecyclables from the recycle stream and contamination (food, oil, etc.) reduces the quality; therefore, the price of the recyclables they sell from collection.

To aid Best Trash in keeping costs down please adhere to the list below and note that this list DOES NOT INCLUDE: broken glass; broken or unbroken ceramic dishes; construction debris; bricks/concrete; carpet remnants and rolls; cloth and material; air conditioner/furnace filters; egg shells (foam/cardboard containers are OK); any type of clothes hangers; and used paper towels, toilet tissue, facial tissue and flushable cleaning cloths.

- Office White, Colored & Computer Paper

- Paper Bags & Phone Books
- Wrapping Paper
- Milk Cartons

- Juice Cartons
- Wax Coated Boxes

#### **CONTAINERS: EMPTY, CLEAN & LOOSE**

- Glass Clear and Colored
- Aluminum Cans
- Aluminum Foil (Clean)
- Aluminum Foil Plates & Serving
- Containers (clean)
- Plastic Bottles, Jars, Tubs & Buckets (shampoo, detergent, condiments, salad dressing, yogurt, margarine, pet food, etc.)
- Plastic Grocery/Newspaper Bags
- Styrofoam containers (clean) & packaging
- Metal Food Cans (aluminum, tin & steel)
- Metal Food Can Lids
- Metal Pots & Pans

**DON'T FORGET Box Tops for Education**: Before putting accepted, cleaned General Mills products such as cereal/cake mix boxes; cake/brownie icing containers; snack/juice containers; refrigerated/dairy products containers; meals and sides (packages and cans); food storage bags and containers; frozen food packages; produce packages; tableware (plate, cups, napkins); paper products (facial tissues, toilet paper, paper towels and flushable cleaning cloth packaging); waste bag cardboard containers; and school/ office products in the recycle cart to check for Box Tops worth .10 cents each to Gleason EL and Cook MS. Also, please check for Labels for Education (think Campbell's Soup and many other products). They may be turned in to Cook MS (Gleason does not participate). Also Barbara Lallinger collects them for Bane EL. ## **PET PLACE** Don't Forget It's the Law: License Your County Pet

Harris County Public Health & Environmental Services reminds us that all dogs and cats over 4 months of age and living in unincorporated Harris County must have a current rabies vaccination and display a Harris County license tag. Failure to comply may result in fines up to \$500 per offence.

There are 3 easy ways to license your pet:

1. ONLINE: @ www.hcphes.org/vph or www.countypets.com

2. IN PERSON: @ the shelter located at 612 Canino Rd. Houston 77076. Visit the websites above for location and hours or call (281) 999-3191.

3. BY MAIL: Form will usually be given to you by your vet at the time your pet receives its' rabies vaccination.

Registration of your pet requires proof of rabies vaccination, proof of spay/neuter and payment of a license fee. An unaltered pet requires an annual licensing fee of \$60. A spayed/neutered pet is \$20 annually and Senior Citizens using a certified assistance dog is \$2 annually. You may also register your pets for up to 3 years by paying triple the fees listed above.

# Willowbridge - Stonebridge



#### INGREDIENTS

1 large angel food cake For the custard: 1 (8-ounce) package cream cheese, softened 1 (14-ounce) can sweetened condensed milk 1 (12-ounce) container frozen whipped topping, thawed For the glaze: 1 cup sugar 3 tablespoons cornstarch 3 tablespoons strawberry gelatin (recommended: Jell-O) 1 cup water

2 cups fresh strawberries, cut in 1/2 (if berries are extra large, they can be cut into quarters)

Whole fresh strawberries and mint leaves, for garnish

#### FOR THE CAKE:

Slice cake, using a serrated knife, horizontally into 3 equal layers.

#### FOR THE CUSTARD:

Mix together cream cheese, condensed milk, and whipped topping in a bowl; set aside.

#### FOR THE GLAZE:

In a medium saucepan, stir together sugar, cornstarch, and gelatin; add water. Cook stirring over medium heat until thick. Remove from heat and allow to cool completely. Fold in strawberries.


#### FOR ASSEMBLY:

Place 1 layer of cake in a large clear bowl. Top with a layer of glaze, followed by a layer of custard mixture. Repeat layering in this order for remaining cake, glaze and custard. Top cake with 3 whole fresh strawberries and fresh mint leaves.

# APRIL GARDENING TIPS

Use this list to help you figure out what gardening tasks you want to accomplish this month.

#### Planning

When purchasing bedding annuals this spring, choose properly grown plants with good color. Buy plants with well-developed root systems that are vigorous, but not too large for their pots. Plants that bloom in the pack are often root bound and can be set back for several weeks after being transplanted. Plants not yet in bloom will actually bloom sooner, be better established and grow faster.

For hot-weather color, select one of the following: Gloriosa Daisy, Madagascar Periwinkle, Ornamental Peppers, Mexican Zinnia or Amaranthus 'Joseph's Coat. Plan to attract hummingbirds to your garden this year by planting red or orange flowers. Monarda (common names: beebalm, horsemint, Oswego tea, and bergamot) is a good perennial plant that thrives in sun and provides nectar for these small birds.

#### Planting

Begin to plant seedlings of warm-season vegetables such as tomatoes, peppers, and eggplants. You can also start your pumpkin seeds now. Sow beets, beans, cucumbers, carrots, lettuce, sweet corn and radishes

Plant herbs such as thyme, sage, parsley, chives and basil

Sod or sow new lawns, and over seed damaged older lawns

Start planting out warm season annuals such as impatiens, marigolds, petunias, sunflowers, zinnia, lobelia, alyssum

Finish planting summer-flowering bulbs like tuberose, gladiolus, dahlias, and callas

Plant chervil, coriander, dill, rosemary, and summer savory outside after the last spring frost date for your area. Your Extension agent should be able to give you the date.

#### Maintenance

Mulch soil to save water, smother weeds, keeps soil cooler. Spread 1-3 inches (2.5-7cm) of bark chips, compost, wood shavings, or other organic material under shrubs trees, annuals and vegetables. Thin vegetables that were sown too thickly, like basil, carrots, green onions, or lettuce. Prune spring-flowering shrubs and trees after bloom is over.

Fertilize everything right now, but do not feed spring-flowering shrubs like azaleas, camellias, and rhododendrons until after they have finished flowering. Use an acid based fertilizer. They also should be pruned after blooming.
